Educational Objectives -God as Trinity

See: Christ Our Pascha, The Catechism of the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church, Part

I can...

- 1. say that God is the Creator who made me and loves me.
- 2. tell you that God created the world, everything in the universe and all things visible and invisible (i.e. heaven, angels).



Parishioners' Books

STEVE (STEFAN) PETELYCKY was born in Ushnia in Western Ukraine on May 24, 1923. Steve's life had its challenges and



his philosophical motto in his later years became "That's life!" Steve was fortunate to survive his imprisonment in Nazi concentration camps during the Second World War. His experience in those camps is recounted in his book "Into Auschwitz, for Ukraine". He worked for CP Air/Canadian Airlines for 20 1/2 years before retiring. Steve and his wife Sofia spent 46 years in their home on Blundell Road, which also housed their home business, Canadian Ukrainian Handcrafts. Steve was a rizbar (wood carver) who enjoyed making and carving plates, crosses, picture frames, boxes and other items which he sold in their store. His works were displayed in several museums, notably the Canadian Museum of Civilization in Ottawa. He was a founding member of the World League of Ukrainian Political Prisoners. He was involved in the collection, shipment and distribution of humanitarian and medical

aid from Canada to Ukraine for over 10 years. His efforts earned him a medal from the Ukrainian Government. Steve was an active member and volunteer at St. Nicholas Ukrainian Catholic Church (Winnipeg), **Protection of the Blessed Virgin Mary Ukrainian Catholic Church (St. Mary's, Vancouver**), the Ukrainian Catholic Eparchy of BC, and the Ukrainian Community Society of Ivan Franco (Richmond). (May 24,1923 – August 29,2014)



Olga Kotelko was born in 1919, in Smuts, Saskatchewan, the 7th of 11 children to Ukrainian immigrants Wasyl and Anna Shawaga; a Super Senior earned 750 gold medals for track and field. The medals are for running and throwing events and each one celebrates her mastery in the sport, 37 world records she earned in 100m, 200m, high jump, long jump, javelin, discus, hammer, and shot put between 1996 and 2014'" the year she turned 95. She believed that maintaining a positive attitude was key to her many years of good health and high energy. She was a fearless competitor who tackled each new adventure with passion and determination: "Wishing for something won't make it happen; you have to work for it.

In 1941 she began teaching in a one-room schoolhouse in Saskatchewan and, later in 1953, moved to New Westminster where she worked for the Burnaby School Board for 30 years until her retirement in 1984 at the age of 65.

She loved travelling around the world to her track and field events. She competed in Hungary, England, Germany, Brazil, Italy, USA, Australia, and Finland. In 2009 she was inducted into the Canadian Master Athletes Hall of Fame, received a YWCA Woman of Distinction award and was named Master Athlete of the Year 2010 from Sport B.C. That same year, she proudly carried the torch in the 2010 Vancouver Olympic Torch Relay. Olga was deeply committed to her Ukrainian Catholic faith. She had been a member of the New Westminster and then (St Mary's) Vancouver Ukrainian Catholic church. She assisted in fundraisers that helped provide charitable support to various organizations in Ukraine. In 2011 she was awarded the Nation Builders Award of the Ukrainian Canadian Congress, Saskatchewan Provincial Council in appreciation for her many years of service in her community.

She enjoyed the camaraderie among the ladies at the **Ukrainian Catholic Women's League of Canada** where she contributed to its strong cultural identity. Because of her age and her outstanding athletic achievements, top scientists in exercise physiology, gerontology, neuropsychology, and evolutionary medicine analyzed her in groundbreaking research trials. Their findings are the subject of a recent book written by **Bruce Grierson** titled, **What Makes Olga Run?** The Mystery of the 90-Something Track Star and What She Can Teach Us About Living Longer, Happier Lives. One of her last extraordinary acts was to write her autobiography. She and her friend **Roxanne Davies** a St Mary's Parishioner co-wrote **Olga: The O.K. Way to a Healthy, Happy Life.** Olga believed an optimistic attitude and regular exercise contribute to good health, better energy, and a happier disposition. **'"Don't focus on your age; focus on how you age**.

Olga Kotelko died on 24 June 2014, in North Vancouver, at age 95, The week before her death, she had competed in three events in the rain at Langley Pacific Invitational in Langley BC. (2 March 1919 – 24 June 2014)
